Author Talk, February 22nd



The Friends of the Plymouth Library are excited to announce that Plymouth resident and Uruguay native Tessa Bridal will speak at the library about her recently-published literary non- fiction book, "The Dark Side of Memory: Uruguay's Disappeared Children and

the Families who Never Stopped Searching."

Her book is a chronicling of how the Cold War played out in South America, told by the children and families who survived.

Born and raised in Uruguay, a third-generation descendent of a resilient and courageous Irish woman who boarded a ship she believed was sailing for Boston only to discover once she was on the high seas that she was heading for Buenos Aires instead. Bridal completed her ancestor's journey by immigrating to the United States in her early 20's. She later returned to South America to conduct interviews with those who survived imprisonment, torture and disappearance under the extremist military dictatorships in Uruguay and Argentina during the 1970s.

The book also documents the involvement of the U.S. in South America at the time. In an interview with Kristen Miller of the <u>Plymouth-Wayzata Sun Sailor</u>, Bridal said she hopes readers will gain "a knowledge of their own country's involvement in the crimes committed in South America - knowledge that might lead them to reconsider their opinions about immigrants and asylum seekers."

Bridal is also the author of two novels, "River of Painted Birds" and "The Tree of Red Stars."

Bridal will appear at the Plymouth Library on Tuesday, February 22, at 6:30 PM. Copies of her book will be available for sale and signing after the program. Masks are required of all attendees.

Message from the Friends' President

The year 2021 is now in our rear-view mirror. A year ago, we were all hoping that the beginning of 2022 would see most of the changes wrought by COVID behind us, but, as we know, that hasn't happened.

In spite of that, the Friends had a very eventful year, due to the support of you, our valued members (now numbering 399 households).

One highlight of the year was an extremely successful virtual Plymouth Reads program in the spring. Linda LeGarde Grover kicked off activities with a talk and slide show about Native American Boarding Schools. The Campfire Play & Sing, which featured songs mentioned in the Plymouth Reads book selection, *This Tender Land*, received a lot of praise and some people watched it over and over again. Several book lovers have reported that they got choked up by the memories that these songs invoked. Another viewer confessed that she sang so loudly her upstairs neighbor pounded on her ceiling but she said it was worth it. It felt so good! The festivities concluded with a delightful talk by the book's author, William Kent Krueger. Kudos to Board member LuAnn Svendsen and the Plymouth Reads Committee for all their hard work (which included reading a large number of books before making the final selection).

Our wonderful library staff continued to provide excellent service throughout the year, and the Friends recognized their hard work with handwritten notes of appreciation and small gift cards for use at Lunds & Byerlys. When the library expanded its hours in the fall, the Friends purchased snacks and Board member Josh Velasquez and his family delivered them to the staff during the first week of longer hours. And over the holidays, the Friends provided "Twelve Days of Snackmas," again as a gesture of support for the library staff.

The Friends Board of Directors continued to meet regularly on the second Thursday of each month, albeit virtually. Election of officers was held in October and we also sent out several newsletters.

In-person programs sponsored by the Friends resumed with the Garden Tour in July, two inperson book sales which generated over \$7300 in revenue, and an author talk by Jodi Melsness about her book "The Lemon Bar Queen."

We face some challenges in 2022: book sales are currently on hiatus, although we expect to resume them at some point this year, and Plymouth Reads will not be held due to circumstances beyond our control. But with the involvement of our members we will continue to support the Plymouth Library and to grow as an organization. Thank you all!

Treasurer Report

Happy New Year! While 2021 continued to be challenging for many reasons, the Friends of the Plymouth Library were able to end the financial year positively. Our book sales in September and November netted more than \$6,400 after the cost of boxes and locker rental. We considered the Garden Tour a smashing success, earning almost \$1,900 after small expenses.

We were able to reinstall the Ready Reads cart in the entryway to the library in June. One dedicated Friend has made certain that a wide variety of books for adults and children are available for purchase from the cart when the library doors are open. At a suggested donation of \$1.00 per book, the cart raised almost \$2,100 in the last half of the year. Many thanks to the person who keeps the Ready Reads cart stocked.

Membership income has picked up after dropping in 2020, when we held only one book sale: 2019: \$3,193 / 2020: \$1,295 / 2021: \$2,109.

And, rounding out the top 4 sources of income in 2021, we received several generous donations during the year, totaling \$1,805. Large donations were made by a book group honoring a recently deceased spouse of one of the members, and at the bequest of a Friends Volunteer, who passed away during 2021. We are especially grateful for these generous donations.

The largest expenses for the year included funds toward programming, a grant to the library itself to install blinds in the northwest meeting room, and locker rental for book sale books.
